






The burning cedars of Lebanon, a symbol of the resilience of the Palestinian people

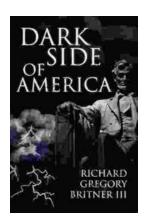


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
